

## Handwriting



We will continue to produce Joined, legible handwriting.

## Spelling

## Content to be taught and applied in writing this year.

Word	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The difference between vocabulary typical of informal speech and vocabulary appropriate for formal speech and writing</li> </ul>
Sentence	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Use of the passive to affect the presentation of information in a sentence (e.g. John broke the window in the greenhouse. / The window in the greenhouse was broken)</li> <li>The difference between structures typical of informal speech and structures appropriate for formal speech and writing</li> </ul>
Text	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Linking ideas across paragraphs using a wider range of cohesive devices (e.g. repetition of a word or phrase, chains of reference, grammatical connections, punctuation)</li> <li>Layout devices to structure text</li> </ul>
Punctuation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Use of the semi-colon, colon and dash to mark the boundary between independent clauses</li> <li>Use of the colon to introduce a list and use of semi-colons within lists</li> <li>How hyphens can be used to avoid ambiguity (e.g. man eating shark / man-eating shark, or recover / re-cover)</li> <li>Use of ellipses (as a cohesive device) ☒ Use of dashes for parenthesis</li> </ul>
